Scripture directs us to be hospitable and inviting communities. At the same time, the reality of spiritual warfare calls us to **protect, train and equip the next generation**. The evil one will attack where good things are happening. Consider our homes, our schools and our churches his prime targets, and pornography one of his most toxic tactics to destroy:

"Pornography is a destroyer of innocence, and the innocence proper to certain years of a boy's life is an important factor in his education-especially if that education is informed by the classical pedagogies of wonder, imagination, and delight. To suppose that boys in general, even boys from good families, are not exposed to pornography in some form or another is naïve. In our day, the presence of porn is a given, being widespread, strategic, and insidious. Porn is inescapable because it is immediately accessible. It is always just a click

away, and hence it is everywhere. That is the reality that must be faced before it can be fought, and prudence demands that parents and educators presume the effects of pornography in the boys of today. Whether boys seek porn out or not, nowadays it is unimaginable that most boys-if not all boys-have not encountered pornography and have not been assaulted by its lies..... Though reports abound analyzing what percentage of the web is devoted to smut, or what the addictive properties of online porn are, or what it is doing to relationships or how it is affecting bodies and brains, one thing is certain without scientific data or social studies: **Internet pornography is damaging the lives and minds of possibly every single boy in this country, impeding his ability to be drawn to virtue and wisdom-in other words, impeding his education.**"

The Basics of Christian Worldview Thinking

We may conclude from a study of the greatest commandment that one of our central duties is to love God with all our *minds*. Moreover, in Deuteronomy 6:4-9, we are directed to impart the greatest commandment to our children when we get up, when we lie down, and when we walk along the road. In short, we are to be teaching our children this all-encompassing love for God, including an intellectual love for God, all the time.

In order to do this, we must first come to the recognition that God is over all, and in all, and through all. "For of Him and through Him and to Him are all things, to whom be glory forever. Amen." (Rom. 11:36). This recognition that God is sovereign over all things, is central to the concept of thinking in a Christian fashion about anything. There is no neutrality in any area of human endeavor because of, and only because of, the sovereignty of God, and of His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ.

...In order for Christian parents to understand and teach every subject in the light of the Lordship of Jesus Christ, they must first believe there is a relationship between Jesus Christ and the subject under consideration. And this is only possible when we understand that God is sovereign over all things.

The task of the Christian parent is to teach his children in such a way that all thoughts are brought under the headship of Christ. "For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal but mighty in God for pulling down strongholds, casting down arguments and every high thing that exalts itself against the knowledge of God, bringing every thought into captivity to the obedience of Christ" (2 Cor. 10:4-5).

We don't bring in this issue for the sake of being 'divisive' or theologically cantankerous. It is simply a matter of historical record that the overwhelming number of Christians who have made contributions in the area of worldview thinking have been Christians who have acknowledged and embraced the doctrine of the sovereignty of God. We cannot readily yearn for the fruit but despise the tree it comes from. Given this, it is not surprising that we have so little fruit. Before we can make our way back, a little plain speaking is in

order. Unless we [retain] the full-orbed theology of the Reformation, we will never [retain] the worldview thinking which is its child.

Fundamental to Christian worldview thinking is the biblical notion of antithesis. An antithesis is a sharp juxtaposition of two claims or views. Part of thinking like a Christian means that we aim to rid our outlook of all non-Christian assumptions about the world, history, human nature, knowledge, science, the arts, and every other subject. In its place we seek understanding from God's revelation on each and every concern, for in Christ "are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge" (Col. 2:3).

To be a Christian is to be in constant, total war. We have no say in the matter, and no one is exempt from serving. This war is not just some sideline feature of the Christian life. It is the Christian life. Every step toward seeing "every knee bow" before the Lord of glory is an act of war, whether in faithfulness or hatred. Until that point, the war is ruthless and relentless. The horrific enemy onslaught never ceases.

This war is not only constant but total, unconfined, and overwhelming. It is not limited to the daily fight against our own sin but encompasses everything within and without. It is not limited to our own or any one time but rages in every corner of history. It is not limited to our own flesh-and-blood world and history but driven by dark clashed in heavenly places. ...

After the initial rebellion, God *imposed* the war between His people and His enemies. It was no accident. The war was decreed. And so the battle has rampaged from Abel and Cain, Israel and Babylon, the apostolic fathers and Gnostics, the Reformers and Rome to contemporary Christianity and modern egalitarian.

Since this constant, total war is divinely imposed, we can hope for no peace except on the sovereign King's terms. To lust after peace and compromise in the midst of such a war is the highest form of rebellion. To seek peace and compromise when God calls for war is to seek to deface God Himself.

From Cain to the new intolerance, anti-Christian


thinking has schemed to deny the reality of the total war. To admit it, of course, would be to admit sin. So, they must fabricate new fictions to whitewash over the division between the friends and enemies of God. They will insist that we are all one people, one planet, or part of god, not allowing any divisions at all. Or they try to shift the dividing line to that between classes, nations, or races. They will embrace anything as long as they can deny the divinely imposed war, and still fight against the people of God. As Augustine declared so long ago, "To the City of Man belong the enemies of God...so inflamed with hatred against the City of God."

This attempted denial is so powerful and central to the enemy's agenda that they exert every effort to convince God's faithful to agree with them. As angels of light, they sucker the church into pagan attempts to save the earth, tolerate hatred of God, and tone down its "dogmatism" since everything is so fuzzy and unclear

anyway. And the other people that go whoring after such enticements will meet their just end: "I will return your retaliation upon your own head" (Joel 3:7).

How are we to do battle in this holy war? We ought to repent of our sinful failure to see the total war in its starkest Scriptural truth. We ought to pray for eyes to see through the wicked (yet innocent looking) pretenses by which the enemy seeks to devour the Church, from fraudulent environmental values to idolatrous patriotism. *Christians ought to be the most skeptical and imaginative people on the face of the earth.* We ought, by God's Spirit, to discipline ourselves and our children in the Fruit of the Spirit, and testimony of faithful warfare. And, most assuredly, we ought to live in the unhesitating confidence that Christ had conquered the enemy, "having disarmed principalities and powers, He made a public spectacle of them, triumphing over them in it" (Col. 2:15).

- We are blessed to be part of this school community, please leave the bin ready for the next party.


